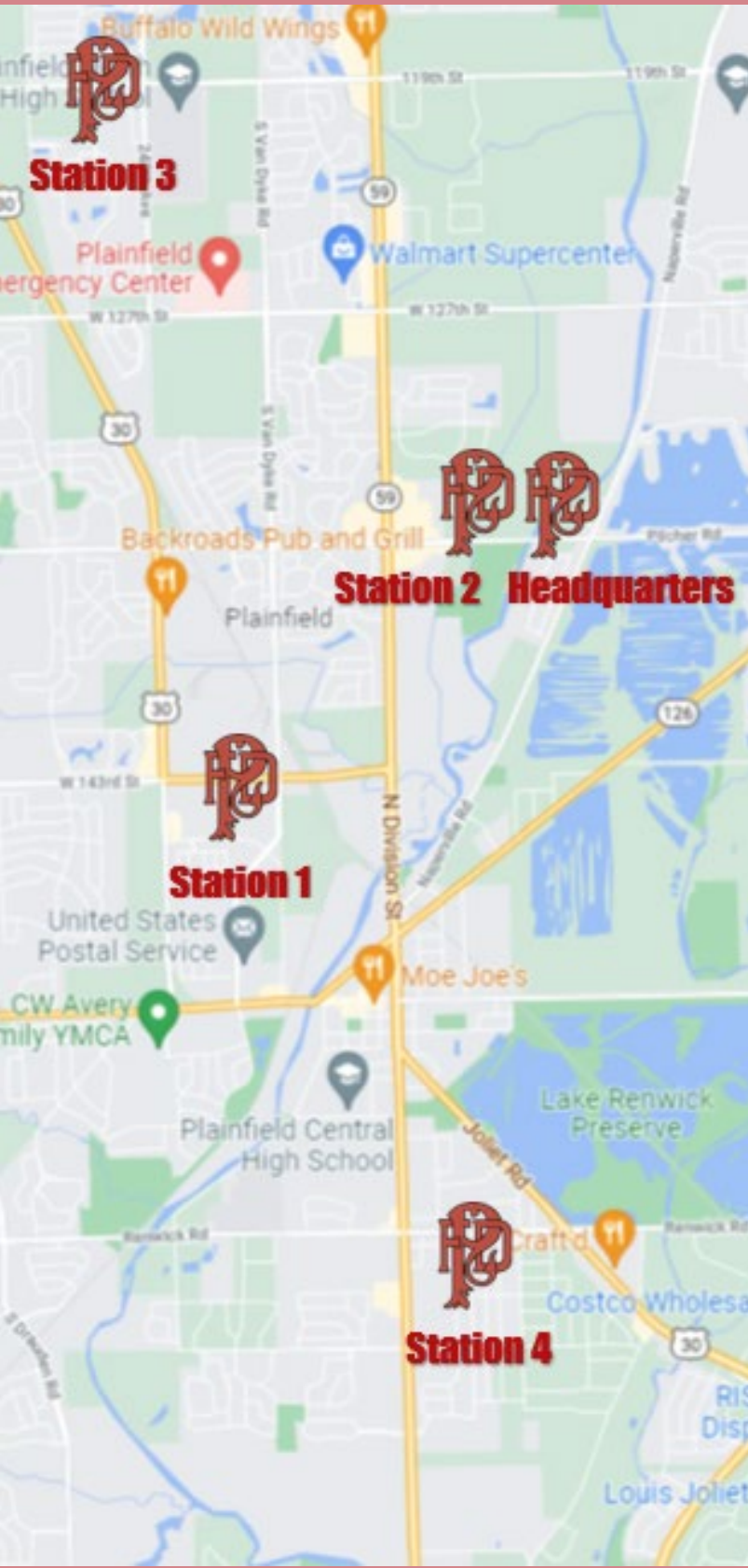

Message from the Chief

I want to welcome you to the 2023 annual report. I hope this report gives you some insight into some of the activities of the fire district. As your new fire chief, I am excited about the future of the fire district. We continue to strive to provide the best possible service to the community be it through our treatment and compassion during emergency medical calls or by saving lives and protecting property during fire incidents.

In 2023 the Fire District had another historic year responding to 5,627 incidents. Over the past four years, the fire district has seen a 19% increase in the demand for services. Emergency medical calls increased 3% over last year and were responsible for 66% of the overall call volume in 2023 while fire calls were down 15%. Though calls for service continue to increase, the Fire District is always prepared and ready to respond.

Two members from the Fire District have retired in 2023, Chief Jon Stratton and EMS Coordinator Cheryl Hansen. Both were instrumental in making Plainfield Fire Protection District what it is today. With the retirements, we welcomed two new positions to our administrative team, a new EMS Coordinator and a Human Resources Generalist.

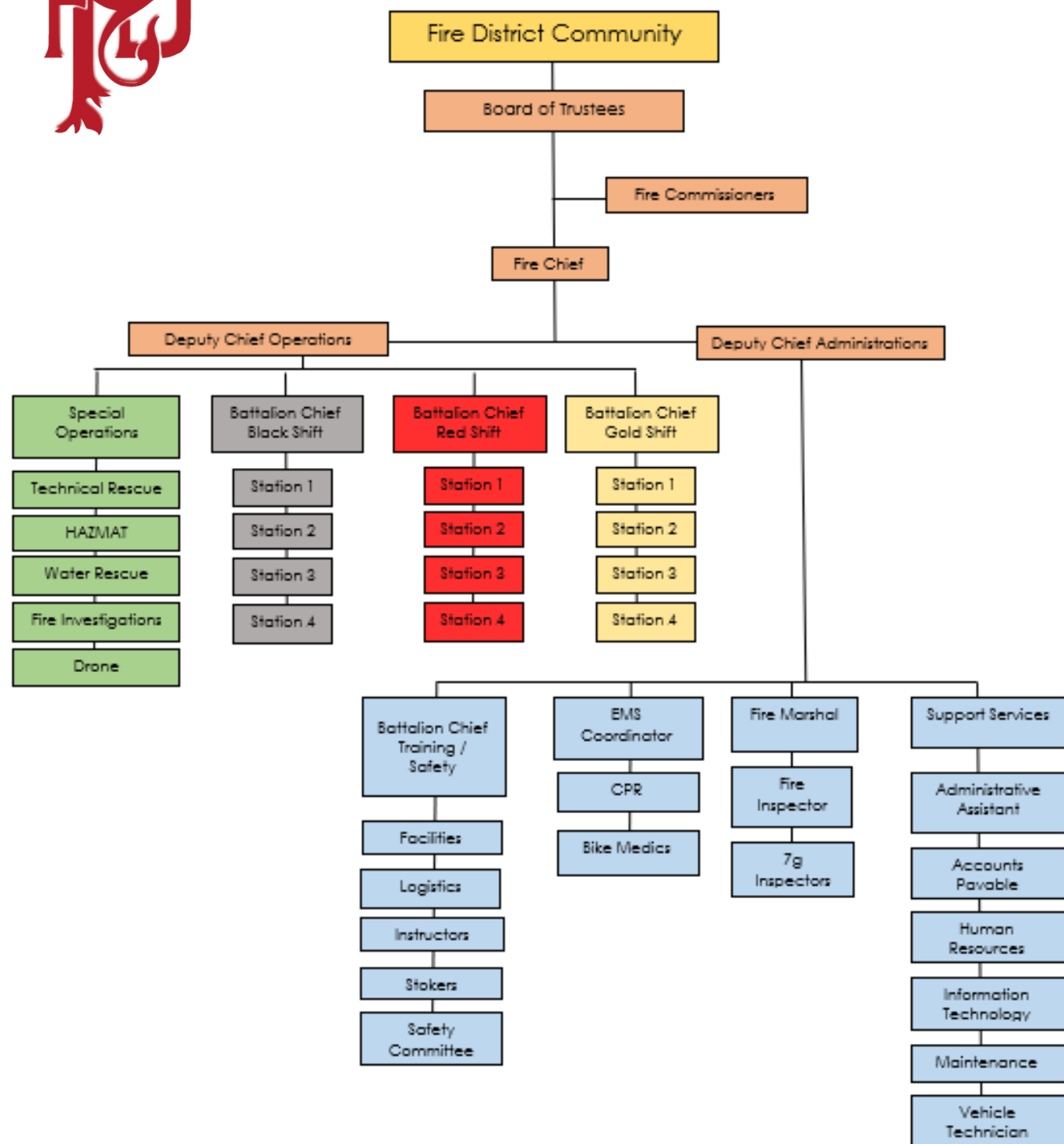
The Fire District prides itself on maintaining a fleet of apparatus that is safe and reliable to respond to emergencies. In doing so, we are anticipating the arrival of our new rescue engine which will be located at fire station 2. Not only can this vehicle function as a fire engine but it is also equipped with specialized equipment to respond to accidents and rescue incidents. Additionally, we are expecting the arrival of a new ambulance which will be housed at fire station 1.

Besides upgrading our apparatus, we continue to advance our equipment as well. In 2024 the Fire District will place in service all new cardiac monitors, CPR assist devices, and Automatic External Defibrillators. This equipment will only enhance our capabilities in providing life-saving care.

I hope you enjoy the 2023 annual report and see some of the highlights the Plainfield Fire Protection District has accomplished. We are always working to enhance services to make the community a safer place.

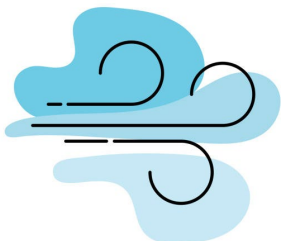

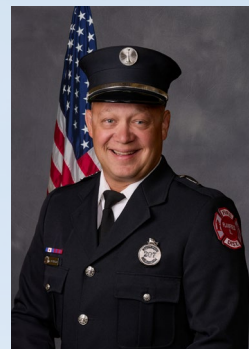

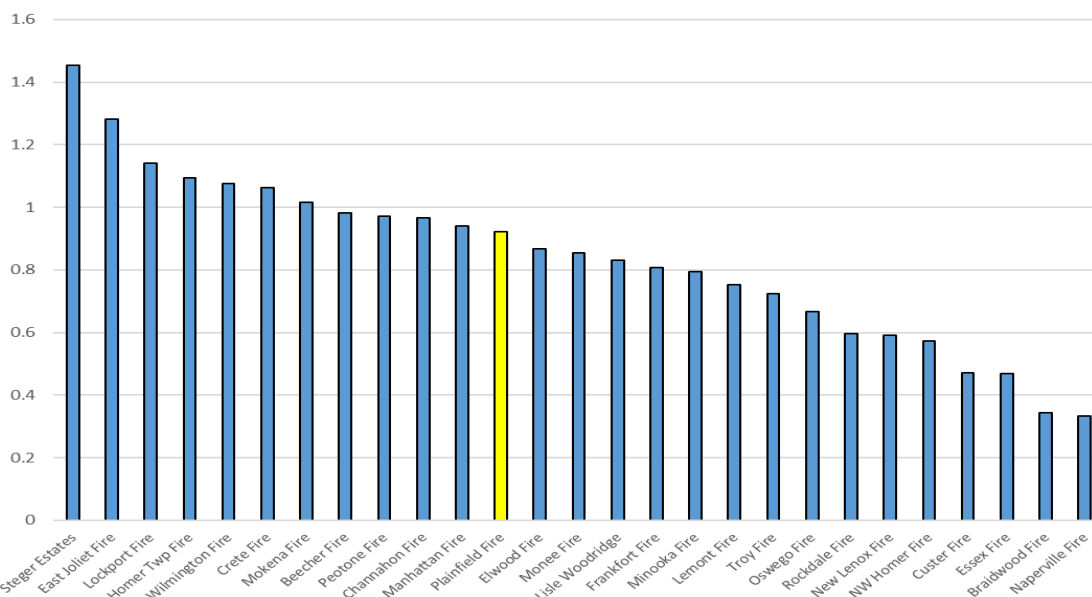

TRAINING DIVISION

The Training Division is responsible for the training of PFPD members and supports the trainings of outside departments.

TECHNICAL RESCUE



The Technical Rescue mitigates calls of a “technical” nature. High Angle rescue, Building Collapse, or Trench Collapse are all incidents that the members of the team are trained and capable of handling.

INVESTIGATIONS

Investigating the cause and origin of a fire is crucial in determining if the fire was accidental or caused by arson. Members of the team are trained to the National standard for fire investigation.



WATER RESCUE

Water Rescue and recovery consists of surface and subsurface rescue and recovery. Team members are qualified in the following capacities: divers, tenders, boat operations, sonar technicians, surface and swift water rescue.



HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

HAZ-MAT team members are trained to respond to leaks, spills, containment and decontamination efforts of hazardous environments.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

We provide public information and community outreach through fire and life safety education presentations and events.

CADET PROGRAM

The cadet program is open to youths 16-21 years old who express interest in becoming a member of the emergency or fire service fields. As a cadet you will join a fire company and learn the day-to-day operations, function as a member of a crew and train as firefighters do.
